## 35th Pastoral Anniversary of Rev. John D. Fuller, Sr

"The Servant Who Answered The Lord's Call" - Isaiah 6:5-8



con Leon and Mrs. Pearlie Mae Fuller, the father of John, Jr., Eva Regina and Frankie Bernard, grandfather of Gamarkis, Raven, Brittany, Farrah and Fahron, was born in Thomson, Georgia, on May 23,1946.

He received his early education in the McDuffie County School System, Thomson, Georgia and graduated from R. L. Norris High School in 1965. Despite many hardships, typical of a sharecropper's family, he was an honor student. His higher education began with one year of study at Paine College in Augusta, Georgia, followed by his obtaining a B.A. Degree in Sociology from Fayetteville State University, Fayetteville, North Carolina. He began his Masters Degree program at Shaw Divinity School, Raleigh, North Carolina, however he transferred to Morehouse School of Religion, Interdenominational Theological Center in Atlanta, Georgia where he received his Master of Divinity Degree, with a concentration in Parish Administration and Biblical Studies. He began studies toward a Doctorate Degree at Boston University's School of Theology, Boston, Massachusetts. He was awarded hon-

orary Doctor of Divinity Degrees by Virginia Seminary and College, Lynchburg, Virginia and Shaw Divinity School, Raleigh, North Carolina. At the age of seventeen (September 23, 1963), he preached his initial sermon during a church business session at Jones Grove Baptist Church, Thomson, Georgia. In 1966, he was drafted into the United States Army and after an overseas assignment in South Korea, he was assigned to Ft. Bragg, North Carolina. While stationed at Ft. Bragg, the young minister was often a guest preacher for local congregations. This exposure caused Baptist Union Baptist Church, Hope Mills, North Carolina to call him in 1969. Our leader assumed the pastorate of Lewis Chapel Missionary Baptist Church the third Sunday in October 1973 in the small white frame church near the intersection of Skibo and Raeford Roads. Eleven months later, ground breaking for a new facility took place. The new structure was dedicated in 1975.

Under his leadership, numerous programs, activities, organizations, and boards have been implemented and/ or expanded. Among those were the Young Adult and Youth For Christ Choirs; Deaconess Ministry; and the Birthday Club. The existing bus ministry was expanded; Annual Black Emphasis Services (for Black History Month); the first female Sunday School Superintendent; the first female Trustee; a departmentalized Sunday School; two earlier morning Sunday Worship services; expansion and reorganization of choirs; an improved Church Training Union; the male usher group; a Music Ministry with a fulltime Minister of Music; two softball associations; for 20 years, a state accredited 4-Star day care center; a Scholarship Committee (funded); a centralized treasury; a tutorial program; children's church; Saturday Academy; Interfaith Hospitality Network for the Homeless; Caring Hands; Mother's Board; SHARE Program; Health Services
